

# THREE TEMPTATIONS OF A TEACHER

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#### **SESSION NOTES:**

- There is always a tendency to trust in our own ability, especially once we have some experience in teaching.
  - Apostolic teachers must rely on the leading of the Spirit, not just manipulating the emotions or intriguing the intellect.



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#### Temptation #1: Stones into Bread (Matthew 4:2-4)

O There is a temptation to gratify the flesh by making stones into bread—using something dead to get your bread. Your students deserve more than dead, dry information from books; they need living, anointed inspiration from Scripture.

#### **Temptation #2: Cast Yourself Down (Matthew 4:5-7)**

O There is a temptation to accommodate the flesh by presuming on God—thinking you are the exception to the principles you are teaching. The teacher must flee from presumptuous sins, guarding the words of their mouth and the meditations of their heart (Psalm 19:13-14).

#### Temptation #3: Lift Yourself Up (Matthew 4:8-10)

O There is a temptation to promote the flesh by circumventing the cross—having a public reputation without private consecration. The teacher's ego is always their enemy, so they have to nail it to the cross daily before they are prepared to teach weekly.
